March 2011

Again this year we, the members of Oakland-Piedmont AAUW, are proud of putting our many hours of volunteer work and money where our mouths and hearts are, in our mission to advance equity for women and girls through advocacy, education, philanthropy, and research.

In September the board voted to support two local programs, "G.U.R.L.S Rock" promoting empowerment and leadership skills in young women and "Young women and Money" sponsored by the Oakland-Berkeley YWCA. This program provides young women ages 18 to 40 the tools to gain financial independence and success. Our member, Gen Katz, attended as a guest and declared, "This was not our mother's money management!"

Girls were introduced to money management for today and for their futures and the program included such things as managing credit and debt and 401Ks. Our donation paid the registration for 10 young women from Castlemont High School to attend.

Of course, we will again be sending five seventh grade girls to the renowned Tech Trek science camp at Sonoma State University. The camp's innovative curriculum encourages the girls to study and pursue careers in the S.T.E.M. fields (Science, Technology, Engineering and Math)

Applications are out for two more of our local scholarships at Merritt and Laney Colleges helping a total of eight women pursue their educational goals.

Where does this money come from and how can you help? Opportunity is just around the corner!

On Sunday, March 14, at the Scottish Rite Center, in downtown Oakland, we will again sponsor our Children's Summer Programs Fair. This is our largest and most successful fund raising program! In addition to the scholarships and conferences above we raise funds for the Legal Advocacy Fund which provides money to support the rights of women in legal cases helping all of us to "Break through Barriers so that we all may have a fair chance."

Our annual fund raiser for Tech Trek, a lovely tea in the home of member Judy Mann, is being held this year on April 16. Come and enjoy the party, and meet some of the Tech Trek campers. They will share some of their wonderful experiences with us!

If you ever wondered what AAUW does with the \$49 annual dues, the EF Funds and the LAF Funds, this [Report](#) is a must-read and will make you appreciate and be proud of your membership all the more.

Dear AAUW members and friends,

I am delighted to celebrate another year as your executive director. Since I first joined AAUW, it has been my goal to increase the visibility of our nationwide community and the remarkable contributions we make to breaking through barriers for women and girls.

As we enter our 130th year, we can all be proud that we are reaching not only our membership but also a vast and diverse public audience with our amazing story of extraordinary philanthropy and activism. Today AAUW is known as a vibrant and dedicated force for change—a go-to authority and sought-after collaborator on a wide range of issues that affect women and their families.

This report highlights some of the outstanding accomplishments of fiscal year 2010. ***This year, AAUW awarded more than \$3 million in fellowships and grants to more than 200 deserving women graduate students and community programs.***

We released another groundbreaking research report, *Why So Few? Women in Science, Technology, Engineering, and Mathematics*, to tremendous media coverage and widespread applause from the professional and lay communities.

We also celebrated two major milestones—the 25th anniversary of the National Conference for College Women Student Leaders and the 35th anniversary of the AAUW Action Fund Capitol Hill Lobby Corps.

Meanwhile, we continue to protect, educate, advocate, research, and lead through numerous national and community-based programs, several of which are featured in this report.

During this past year, we have expanded our work on high school and college campuses through student government campaign training, salary negotiation skills workshops, Title IX compliance reviews, and campus sexual assault prevention programs. And we celebrated a number of victories on Capitol Hill, including the passage of the Matthew Shepard and James Byrd, Jr. Hate Crimes Prevention Act, which extended hate crimes protections to gender-based violence.

From time to time, we will be giving you updates or highlights from activities, events, etc., from the AAUW Funds. This one is a bit of history about the Legal Advocacy Fund (LAF)

Many of you will recall that in 2006, the LAF joined the Women's Law Center in their amicus curiae brief filed in the Ledbetter vs. Goodyear Tire case. In that case Lilly Ledbetter had worked for Goodyear nearly 20 years. After her retirement she filed an EEOC complaint alleging, among other things, that for years her male counterparts received raises for doing the same or lesser work. The court denied her disparate pay claim, stating that she should have filed suit when the unequal pay decisions were initially made, instead of after the 180-day statutory limit; although Plaintiff maintained that someone anonymously passed her a card with a note at her retirement party advising of pay differentials between her and male counterparts at the company; the issue of whether she knew or should have known about the pay disparity before her retirement party was disputed. Justice Ruth Ginsburg filed a dissenting opinion arguing that each time Ledbetter was paid less than her male counterparts were, a new, actionable pay decision was made.

Following this huge loss at the Supreme Court, legislation was introduced to amend the Civil Rights Act of 1964 -- stating that the 180-day statute of limitations for filing an equal-pay lawsuit regarding pay discrimination resets with each new discriminatory paycheck.

On January 29, 2009, President Obama signed his very first bill into law—the Lilly Ledbetter Fair Pay Act. AAUW and LAF played a major role in that victory, by supporting the Ledbetter case and leading the charge to communicate with Congress to vote to support the legislation. AAUW Executive Director Linda Hallman, CAE, and Director of Public Policy and Government Relations Lisa Maatz attended the signing ceremony at the White House along with Lilly Ledbetter.

AAUW has long been on the front line of the fight for pay equity. The organization released its first equal pay report in 1913, and AAUW members were in the Oval Office when President John F. Kennedy signed the Equal Pay Act of 1963 into law.

LAF Supports Plaintiffs in Wal-Mart Lawsuit

In January, the AAUW Board of Directors approved LAF case support for our first case outside of academia. AAUW will sign at least one amicus brief in support of the plaintiffs in the [Dukes v. Wal-Mart Stores Inc.](#) lawsuit. AAUW also will invite local AAUW members and staff to show support for the plaintiffs during the oral argument at the U.S. Supreme Court on March 29, 2011. The court will review lower court decisions that allowed female Wal-Mart employees to pursue employment discrimination claims as a class. If approved, the case will become the largest civil rights class action in U.S. history, including as many as 1.5 million women who will seek billions of dollars in back pay.

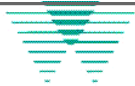
